1118196	Bankside Open Spaces Trust	BOST Training And Recognition Programme	<p>BOST supports local residents and volunteers from all different backgrounds to come together, to improve green spaces in Borough and Bankside. Volunteers give many hours to help maintain and enhance vibrant local parks and housing land for everyone to enjoy. We are seeking funding to engage more local residents, making them aware of volunteer opportunities with BOST and provide volunteer training. We will host a volunteer taster event, workshops on specialist subjects such as sustainability, greening and wildlife and a trip to a Southwark Park, open to all Southwark residents. Events will be advertised throughout the Borough and Bankside ward. The BOST Volunteer Certificate (BVC) will be launched to support the training and experience of our volunteers. An understanding of horticulture and gardening skills will be taught and recorded, allowing our volunteers to demonstrate their achievements. The BVC will consist of 10 units such as safe working practices, tool use, pruning and planting and will be run in a relaxed, inclusive way. Current volunteer feedback has shown demand for this scheme.</p> <p>Through our workshops, events and development of the BVC we will bring people together to improve their neighbourhood and gain a sense of achievement and recognition. Successful volunteers may have the opportunity to progress to our Future Gardeners City and Guilds course and will be able to demonstrate their skills to training providers and employers.</p>	£3,220
1118406	Bankside Open Spaces Trust	Nature Explorers	<p>The project aims to engage children and their parents with nature and learning to play outdoors. BOST will achieve this by holding 10, one hour afterschool nature sessions during the spring and summer term to give ideas of the types of activities children can do and have fun in their local parks. Activities will include pond dipping, insect hunting, leaf rubbing, identifying bird etc. This will give them the skills to appreciate nature independently. The sessions will be aimed at ages 3-11 year old to inspire them at a young age. More children are playing indoors, which research shows not only affects their physical health but mental health and well-being. Many of the families do not have gardens and limited access to nature. Allowing a space for children to play outdoors and learn to connect with nature is essential for their development.</p>	£1,082

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1119568	Bankside Open Spaces Trust	Borough And Bankside Community Events	<p>Community events have become increasingly important, to strengthen the community, build relationships, understanding and create a sense of belonging and wellbeing. We would like to run 3 to meet the varied needs of the ward. A spring event to mark the start of the growing season for families and children after school. Our event last year attracted over 350 children.</p> <p>Our aims are to encourage interaction with open spaces, to get outside and be active after winter, parents to meet each other, children to make friends. This improves health and wellbeing of the whole family. We will run activities about growing, the environment and springtime. The Great Get Together a daylong event for everyone, promotes cohesion, celebrating what we hold in common and working together. Last year it involved 45 different local groups, cultural organisations, schools and businesses with an audience of 9000. Every year more people ask to be involved. The event runs across Redcross Way and Union Street includes dance, music, performance, community information food and craft stalls. Merry Mingle is a smaller event at Redcross Garden, aimed at our older community, although children are catered for to allow parents to attend, to bring people together when many can feel isolated or lonely. Christmas is a hard for people without friends of family and we have found that for some service users it will be the only event they attend. We will have music, food, craft and Christmas lights. There are multiple major development schemes such as Peabody Triangle and Landmark Court & there is no adequate resource to enable residents to properly/technically respond to this. Living Bankside (formerly known as Bankside Residents' Forum) was set up by residents in 1995 to involve & empower local residents in the regeneration process. The area has a population of 10,000+ with formal TRA's or resident bodies like Styles House and loose groups of neighbours, such as in New Globe Walk.</p> <p>Residents currently face an onslaught of proposed changes & redevelopment plans and their inability to influence these proposed changes is making residents feel powerless, airbrushed and anxious. This is consequently having a negative effect on the mental well-being of some residents. The first Grand Iftar was held at St George the Martyr Church on 4th July 2016 and subsequently on 15th June 2017 at Southwark Cathedral (crucial in the aftermath of the London Bridge Attacks). Hundreds of residents have wrote to Living Bankside and indicated to Living Bankside that they would like to see a return of a Film Club.</p> <p>The film Club will be open to all residents in the Bankside, Borough and surrounding areas. 1118461	Mint Street Music Festival Team	Mardi Gras With Blackfriars Settlement Mental Health Arts	<p>Mardi Gras will combine British Pancake Day with international Mardi Gras and Carnival celebrations, bringing a colourful event to multiple venues: Age UK Stones End Day Centre, Blackfriars Settlement, Hopton's Alms houses, Mint Street Adventure Playground, Great Suffolk Street and Charles Dickens Primary School.</p> <p>From January to March we will run art workshops, leading up to event days, when groups will share the artwork they have made and musicians and dancers will tour the venues. We will also make use of the two wooden wheeled stages / float bases to create carnival floats – these were made by Blackfriars Settlement Mental Health Woodwork Group this summer. To enhance the experience, we will hire costumes from London School of Samba to display in the art room for inspiration and we will provide celebration food for the group on the Mardi Gras event day.</p> <p>These workshops on LGBTQ+ Health will explore how LGBTQ+ communities access health services, their shared lived experiences and how intersectionality may affect this. This project has arisen based on evidence we have gathered from a borough wide community led survey on LGBTQ+ experiences in the borough. 83% of respondents said they don't know of any LGBTQ+ health services. Bankside and Borough was noted by the highest number of respondents as being a where local residents felt safe. For this reason, we feel it is appropriate to centre this project in an area that anecdotally has a significant LGBTQ+ community, and is considered to be a safe space. 			<p>Preliminary results show that under 40% of respondents know or of believe that there are LGBTQ+ inclusive or specific health services and that BAME respondents don't feel engaged with local services. 1113054	Stones End Day Centre	Active Ageing - Sports Day	<p>We are applying for this money to fund the Sport and Activity Day on the grounds of our day centre and the community centre. On the day will aim to increase older people's mental and physical wellbeing through the provision of fun-filled activities and entertainment whilst reducing isolation through interaction with their peers.</p> <p>Only 19.55 of Southwark older residents are active and 42.7% live alone. With already high rates of diabetes, hypertension, cancer, and heart disease, present in the borough and loneliness being rife, the risk of these conditions increases and in turn substantially increases the risk of dementia by 64%. For many of our older people taking part in sporting activities can seem like a chore and unachievable. 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1118387	The Bunker	Borough Playwrights Underground	<p>Playwrights Underground is a Borough & Southwark focused expansion of our Writers Room, a space in our building given to playwrights as cheap workspace for next year – providing dedicated time and space to work on new ideas and receive mentorship.</p> <p>This space, with stationary, laptops and kitchen facilities has been made available after many young playwrights from Southwark and the wider community asked us for space to write outside of their our homes, and for mentorship and development opportunities. Sometimes access to equipment is key: in the case of one talented young playwright, she had resorted to writing her play on her mobile phone.</p> <p>We have made already made our space accessible to Southwark audiences through Southwark Presents – through whom all Southwark residents are eligible for discounted tickets. We also provided space for the Bankside Great Get Together event earlier this year.</p> <p>Support from the Neighbourhoods Fund would allow us to dedicate two spaces in our Writers Room, for free, to playwrights local to Borough & Bankside and other residents with stories to tell. We would support each artist that spends more than a week with us - whether consecutively or accumulatively - with a mentorship session with our Artistic Director. This is a very distinct offer to Southwark's existing creative writing offer through adult learning courses and poetry schemes, and with this support will lead to the inclusion of residents in the Bunker's programming.</p>	£4,950

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1118942	Bermondsey Street Festival Community Interest Company	Bermondsey Street Festival 2019	<p>2019 will be the thirteenth Bermondsey Street Festival. In that time we have grown from a small event in a park to a much larger event involving street closures and an estimated attendance of in excess of 15000. The event is funded through Commercial Sponsorship, Funding grants and the sales of stall pitches. In 2018 the event cost £42000 to run. Over the last two years we have seen significant growth in Children attending the event and we are seeking to adapt the event accordingly. While the event is in Grange Ward it does share a border with Chaucer Ward and does benefit a very wide spectrum of residents in that area.</p>	£3,000
1119533	Construction Youth Trust	Construction Into Schools	<p>Young Southwark residents risk joining the 6.5% of the working age population in the borough that is unemployed. Even in employment, 21% of residents are in low-paid jobs. The current jobs market is "hourglass shaped", offering mostly low skilled, low paid jobs or highly skilled, highly paid jobs.</p> <p>Southwark is also home to major regeneration and development projects, in areas such as Canada Water, Elephant & Castle and Bermondsey. This will create a pipeline of training/employment for thousands of local young people over 10-15 years. The construction sector offers a huge variety of jobs (e.g. Bricklaying, Computer Aided Design, Marketing) and bucks the hourglass jobs market trend, with plenty of middle-tier jobs and progression routes. However, awareness of these opportunities is low amongst young people and teachers/advisers. In a 2015 survey, only 3% of 18-25 year olds had actively searched for a job in construction.</p> <p>This project will connect employers involved in development with local schools (including SSSO and Ark Globe) and their students to facilitate employer engagement activities. We will raise awareness of local training/employment opportunities in construction and provide students with employer encounters (shown to reduce chances of unemployment and increase earning). Ultimately, we aim to support young residents to successfully progress into further education, training or employment and into careers with real opportunities for progression.</p>	£7,500

The project transforms an underused amenity into an oasis, creating street-level interest with a ground-floor café space. 1114254	Southwark Explorers' Club	Southwark Explorers' Club	<p>Since April 2018, we have continued to organise weekly activities for our members. They provide cultural, artistic and historic interest and, very importantly, continue to support friendship between a diverse group of elderly people in Southwark. We have visited local museums, art galleries, livery halls, attended concerts, the theatre and been to several live relays at East Dulwich Picture house. In May, we were moved by the play 'For King and Country' at Southwark Playhouse. In July, 27 members (21 were black Afro-Caribbean) went to the 'Windrush: Songs in a Strange Land' exhibition at the British Library. In October, we are going to Twelfth Night at the Young Vic and, in November, we are going to see 'Knock', an exhibition about humour in contemporary art at South London Gallery. We also went in May to Thorpe Bay by train on a £6 Senior Rover ticket from Fenchurch Street station.
